Through this revelation we will explore the many representations of sexual mores in Greek culture today and reflect on how history plays into the present. From this deeper perspective we will reference back to our own culture and current choices, beliefs and values. This is a rare opportunity to dialogue about internal and social discoveries around the often overlooked and taboo subjects of Love, Sex and Marriage. We will learn more about ourselves, history and another culture, one rich with erotic and sexual symbology as evidenced in Greek pottery, poetry, sculpture, mythology and even in Greece's souvenir shop windows!

Course Objectives:

- Explore individual sexual scripts and love maps that create our current attitudes about love, sex and marriage
- Compare the ancient cultural norms of Greek history to the history that we are creating today through our own cultural practices.
- Explore this rich Mediterranean culture through a playful lens that takes notice of the many erotic images on display in public places
- Reflect on personal values and perspectives on the role of love, sex and marriage in our own individual lives

Course Content:

The Greeks gave us the word Psychology, originally meaning psyche (soul), ology (study of). Drawing back from more scientific definitions and re-uniting with the ancient Greek meaning of the word, Psychology, study of the soul, we use poetry as a path to delve deeper into self-understanding as well as clarifying our purest connections to each other. We will explore the Greek philosophy of self-knowledge as the core of education. With the enigmatic inspiration of poet, Odysseas Elytis, as well as other Greek poets, both historic and contemporary, Sappho, Homer, George Seferis, Kate Palamas, Yannis Ritsos, and Cavafy, we will embark on a rich inner voyage. We will ask ourselves such questions as "what are my most innate and voluptuous gifts and my deepest passions?" In a culture known for her infinite blue Aegean waters, fiery sunsets and sensual white architecture, we will explore how to more fully create a Passionate Life.

Objectives:

- To understand the original Greek meaning of the field of psychology and its connection to passion
- To give students a general overlay of Greek culture through its poetic language
- To develop a deeper understanding of self through the exploration of individual stories, experiences and philosophies
- To understand more fully the unique gifts we carry and the innate ways we have of belonging in the world
- To practice speaking openly about our passions
- To explore intelligence through a more ancient Greek perspective
- To discover what gives our life meaning and sustains us through difficult times
- To mine our souls for inspired and tangible vision and direction
